Tamara Mason, MPH,CHES is a public health professional, consultant, and advocate who works to improve the health and well being of marginalized communities. Tamara graduated from Brown University in 1998 with a B.A. degree in Health and Society, with a concentration in Maternal and Child Health. She earned a Master of Public Health (MPH) degree, with a concentration in Behavioral Sciences and Health Education in August 2003 from the Rollins School of Public Health of Emory University. She has held several research and program management positions within Emory University, including serving as the Director of a breast cancer education and outreach program for over a decade. Currently, Tamara is the Director, Maternal and Child Health Collective Impact, at the March of Dimes. In this role, she leads the efforts in Atlanta to reduce the inequities in preterm births and maternal mortality. Tamara is also the Founder and Principal Equity Consultant of Mason Consulting, Inc. LLC. Mason Consulting assists communities and organizations with improving their health outcomes and indicators via a health equity and social justice lens. Lastly, Tamara is also a Certified Health Education Specialist (CHES) and certified labor doula.

DR. JEANINE **ABRAM-MCLEAN**

FAIR COUNT

Dr. Jeanine Abrams McLean is the President at Fair Count, a nonprofit, nonpartisan organization, founded by Stacey Abrams. The goal of Fair Count is to build long term power in communities that have been historically undercounted in the decennial census, underrepresented at the polls, and whose communities are often torn apart in redistricting. She is a highly skilled researcher with over 20 years of experience designing, managing, and implementing population based studies and projects, and she has authored 25 peer reviewed publications.

Born and raised in Mississippi, Dr. Abrams McLean attended the Mississippi School for Mathematics and Science. She received a bachelor's degree in Biology

Most recently, she developed the Science for Social Equity program, which pairs community organizers and scientific researchers to create community driven solutions to science related issues that impact underrepresented communities. She also leads the Pandemic to Prosperity: South initiative (in partnership with the Southern Economic Advancement Project and the National Conference on Citizenship), which examines numerous data indicators associated with underlying disparities to help ensure that Southern communities and communities of color are not disproportionately impacted by future health crises.

DR. THOMAS **DOBBS**

THE UNIVERSITY OF MISSISSIPPI MEDICAL CENTER

Thomas Dobbs assumed the role of Dean of the John D. Bower School of Population Health on August 1, 2022. In addition to his role as Dean, Dr. Dobbs teaches Epidemiology for the School of Population Health and the School of Health Related Professions. He has a clinical position within the Division of Infectious Disease, working specifically in the fields of HIV and Sexually Transmitted Infections with a focus on the intersection of disease and the social determinants of health.

Dr. Dobbs has a long career working at the crossroads of clinical medicine and public health as a physician, researcher and public health leader. He has held numerous leadership roles within the Mississippi State Department of Health including State Epidemiologist and State Health Officer (a role through which he directed the state's response to the COVID pandemic). In his role as State Health Officer, Dr. Dobbs focused the agency on addressing the numerous health inequities that plague our state. Additionally, he has worked in leadership roles nationally and internationally in the fight against diseases such as HIV and tuberculosis.







After graduating, Garrett worked at a variety of radio stations and was also a regular in the entertainment field while public health, including community outreach, program development, and health education was still close to his heart. He quickly realized that traditional health education methods were not always effective in reaching underserved communities. He saw an opportunity to bring his experience in the performing arts to be art, and he began creating and performing pieces

Growing up, Garrett was involved in various theater and dance programs, where he discovered his love for performing. He was particularly drawn to the impact that poor health can have on communities and individuals, and he was inspired to use his talent s to make a difference.

Laurie is an Advanced Implementation Specialist (AIS) with the Opioid Response Network (ORN); a Steering Committee Member for the Peer Recovery Center of Excellence Workforce Development; an adjunct faculty member of Faces and Voices Recovery Training Institute (RTI);

Laurie is a Certified Behavioral Consultant (CBC), a Certified Recovery Specialist (CRS); a Recovery Support Supervisor (RSS); a Forensic Peer Specialist (FPS); a Recovery Coach Professional (RCP); and has a degree in Health Administration. Laurie brings over 31 years of lived recovery experience (Established May 30, 1991), to the revolutionary and rewarding work of Recovery Support Services and Recovery Coaching.

Laurie is a trainer of the CCAR Recovery Coach Academy and Ethical Considerations for Recovery Coaches; a facilitator of the PA Family Support Alliance (PFSA) Recovering Families Program, and the PROACT Family Education Series. Laurie was named the 2020 Recovery Advocate of the Year by the Pittsburgh Recovery Walk. DR. STEVE **STRAUBING**

ADDICTIONOLOGIST

Dr Steve Straubing is an addictionologist at Meridian Behavioral Healthcare in Gainesville, Florida since 2014. Meridian is a nonprofit facility providing addiction, psychiatry and primary care services to several thousand individuals at multiple locations throughout North Central Florida. Most of Meridian's patients are underinsured and many are unhoused and have had little to no preventive care and present with multiple medical, psychiatric and substance use problems.

Dr Straubing treats patients in Meridian's inpatient detoxification unit and is the medical director of the Meridian methadone clinics in Gainesville and Chiefland Florida. In addition, he treats patients in

His primary clinical interests include optimizing the interface between detoxification and the transition to continuing care, harm reduction and training the next generation of physicians in Addiction Medicine. He has a keen interest in applying neurobiological principles to rational therapy for substance use disorders.

Dr. Steve Straubing is a consultant for the Opioid Response Network and has given training sessions on multiple topics pertaining to Opioid Use Disorder to a variety of professionals. He is also a mentor for the Providers Clinical Support System {PCSS}.



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What Is the Opioid Response Network?

The *Opioid Response Network* is a group of diverse individuals and organizations working collaboratively to address the opioid and stimulant crisis in this country.

In an effort to address the opioid and stimulant use disorder crisis, the federal Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration awarded funding to the American Academy of Addiction Psychiatry and a coalition of national organizations to provide evidence-based practices in the education and training of substance use disorders.



What Do We Do?



The *Opioid Response Network* is working with states, health professionals, communities, organizations, healthcare centers, the justice system and individuals in all 50 states and nine territories to provide education and training at no cost tailored specifically to address local needs.

ORN has a vast network of prevention, treatment and recovery consultants in every state, ready to work with you to address the opioid and stimulant healthcare crisis in your area.

To date, *ORN* has responded to more than 3,000 requests and impacted more than 3 million people nationwide.

How Can We Help You?
